

Woldingham Station, Titsey and Tatsfield Circular Walk

NORTH DOWNS WAY

Route

- **1.** From car park cross bridge, follow road to T junction.
- 2. Carefully turn left up the road (beware traffic).
- **3.** 500m, turn left onto bridleway. Take a footpath to the right side of house called "Shires", bear left through buildings.
- 4. Fingerpost at junction, take the path slightly left. Follow trees across the field to the right and cross railway bridge on the left.
- 5. Cross the track, turn right then left through gate. Follow hedge line uphill, over a stile into woods, continue until the road.
- **6.** Turn right and follow road to T junction. Turn right, then ahead onto Upper Court Road.
- 7. At the corner of the bend head straight onto a path, follow down a slope to the road. Turn right, then left onto track. Straight ahead on path with hedge right to a road. Cross to the car park to the viewpoint. Continue left to the end of the car park and into the wood.

- 8. At Whistlers Court turn right, then right again at road signposted to Oxted and Limpsfield. As the road bears right, keep straight on the path down the slope.
- 9. At the T junction head down the slope, bearing left along a fence. Take the second stile on the right to the other side of the fence line. At the T junction turn left, then turn right downhill along fence line.
- 10. Halfway down take a sharp left into woods. At the junction take the wide path bearing left with red arrow on the bench. Continue straight ahead. Detour right to enjoy viewpoint down to Titsey Place on the left.
- 11. Continue ahead until a junction of paths. Turn left uphill onto the North Downs Way National Trail. Climb to the top of the hill to the road. Turn left here for Botley Hill Farmhouse Pub on the B269 (350m).
- 12. At the top of the Hill turn hard right onto road, then left onto tarmac track marked North Downs Way through woods with road on your right. Follow NDW as it turns left uphill and then right along the marked NDW route. At the road cross to opposite path and into woodland. Continue through gate to pen field, another gate back into woods.

- 13. Arrive at the viewpoint and Coccolith Art Installation. Cross the road (leaving the NDW) and take a path over the stile beside Clarks Lane Farm. Cross the field diagonally, over a stile on the opposite side. Pick up the path over the golf course. (Beware golfers!). Spot yellow post on the path, continue through trees, turn left at the fence. Follow fence line between two fields. Pass through gate at crossing and through two gates to the opposite side of the valley. Cross another gate to the road.
- 14. Turn left onto pavement pass School to village green. (Keep bearing right to visit "Ye Old Ship" pub). From the green continue ahead past pond, take path across the common and playground on the right to the road. Follow the road through an estate.
- 15. Follow road uphill and turn left onto bridleway. Follow this path with hedge on your right. End of the field go through gate and continue straight. Bottom of the slope go between two trees onto a smaller path, through gate into field. Continue straight on with hedge on your right. Follow the path diagonally across field to the other side onto road. Turn right, pass cottages then turn left, opposite Culverkeys Cottage, across a field to a metal gate and continue for 100m with trees to your right.

- Approaching buildings bear left through a gate, continue right diagonally across field with power cables on your right. Halfway across the field turn left going downhill to the bottom of the valley.
- 16. Turn left at wide track through metal gate for 150m, then right uphill to a gate into woods. Continue uphill following yellow arrow markers. Stay on the track out of woods and cross a large open field on the wide footpath. Go through a gate and onto Limpsfield Road.
- 17. Turn left on tarmac pavement, cross to bridleway on a gravel track, and through a gate. Continue on wide track to Warren Barn Farm. Cross the road and take the wide track on the other side.
- 18. At the next road junction turn right onto Butlers Dene Road for 800m to Halliloo Valley Road. Cross over to High Lane. Take first path on left along edge Golf Club until road. Cross over to Park Ley Road, then right onto bridleway past "The Garden Flat". Cross over at bridleway and cycle route 21. (Follow the road here for Garden centre, café and toilets). At the next junction turn left, as the road veers right under a bridge, signposted to Woldingham School. At a white house, turn left onto private rood with barrier to return to Woldingham Station.
- 19. Return to Woldingham Station.

Local Facts

Coccolith is inspired by the very creatures that, 65 million years ago, formed the chalky foundations of the North Downs Way and invites visitors to take a seat and immerse themselves in this rolling and quintessential landscape.

Built using traditional dry-stone wall techniques, using a hand-picked selection of local ironstone rock excavated from the Titsey Estate along with 'clunch' chalk for its earthy historical aesthetic and so as not to impinge on the natural beauty of the landscape.

St Mary's Church was built in the 11th - 12th century and is a Grade 2 listed building. A delightful church seating a congregation of approximately 60, set in a prominent position on high ground with extensive views to the South West. It is largely 11th and 13th century with Victorian and recent additions, all of which successfully complement one another.

The church is constructed of clunch with an infilling of flint and Kentish ragstone quoins and dressings. It has brick and stone buttresses with tiled shoulders and the Chancel and north side are rendered.

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



Visit Coccolith - an Inspiring Views artwork
