

50 MINUTE WALK FROM TITSEY ESTATE


Coccolith and Titsey Estate Short Walks

Route

- **1.** Leaving the Tea Room car park take the Titsey Foundation Walk along the plantation.
- 2. Join up with the North Downs Way going up the steep and unpaved Water Lane up to the roundabout at the top of Titsey Hill.
- **3.** Walkers parking at the Pitchfont Lane Car Park will join the walk here.
- 4. Carefully cross the road and follow the North Downs Way to the art installation at Clarks Lane. Return via the same route.

On Titsey Estate, this artwork by Instar is made from iron stone from the nearby quarry and white lias limestone inspired by the local geology.

Points of Interest

Book to visit the historic Titsey Estate House and Gardens (limited opening times)

Local Facts

Coccolith is inspired by the very creatures that, 65 million years ago, formed the chalky foundations of the North Downs Way and invites visitors to take a seat and immerse themselves in this rolling and quintessential landscape.

Built using traditional dry-stone wall techniques, using a hand-picked selection of local ironstone rock excavated from the Titsey Estate along with 'clunch' chalk for its earthy historical aesthetic and so as not to impinge on the natural beauty of the landscape.

St Mary's Church was built in the 11th - 12th century and is a Grade 2 listed building. A delightful church seating a congregation of approximately 60, set in a prominent position on high ground with extensive views to the South West. It is largely 11th and 13th century with Victorian and recent additions, all of which successfully complement one another.

The church is constructed of clunch with an infilling of flint and Kentish ragstone quoins and dressings. It has brick and stone buttresses with tiled shoulders and the Chancel and north side are rendered.

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



