# Heathland Artworks

## 1. Fruits of Desire by Varshini Chandrashekar

Fruits of Desire is a sculptural installation that addresses excessive human desires, the impact of which consumes us in return. It features fruit-like forms with human mouths, made from terracotta and reclaimed clay.

## 2. Heathland Echoes by Fiona Goldswain

This sound work was inspired by the surrounding heathland to enhance visitor experience. Echoing the woodland shape with pieces sourced from the heathland, it provides a resting place for the birds and to add to the vibration of the environment.

## 3. TOIL II by Amelia Gunn-Dalby

Gunn-Dalby's video performance with her sculpture is based on research into the toil of women in the Heathlands area during the 18th-19th centuries to consider the labour that has gone into maintaining the land whilst it sustains local communities.

## 4. Invasion of Space by Daniel Babu

We take from nature without thinking about the environmental consequences. There is a real need to preserve these spaces so that they can thrive. My work intends to shed light on the invasion of these spaces by people through site specific artwork.

## 5. Adders, Vipera berus by Sally Ferguson

A mating pair of Adders, the male is the smaller black and white snake. These cloth snakes are stuffed with sand and beechnuts and are x 4-5 actual length.

## 6. Unearthed: Devices of Discovery by Yuhan Chien

An interactive sculptural object that reveals the hidden layers of the land. Inspired by the varied terrain, this piece invites viewers to lift and explore the structure to discover symbolic underground forms beneath a miniature above-ground landscape. It is both playful and educational—encouraging closer attention to the natural world.

## 7. The Family by Kim Bardle

The Family, is a reflection of the significance of family and roots. Just as tree roots intertwine and connect, family connections remain through our roots that bind us.

## 8. Rhythms That Surround Us by Saniya Farooq

This explores the dynamic between wind and movement. By animating a painted figure with the wind's gentle touch, it encourages contemplation of the interplay between nature and human perception, inviting viewers to appreciate nuances of the environment.

## 9. The Tree Necklace by Polina Knight

An Insect Habitat contained in an Egg amongst 300+ hand made porcelain beads, made in thanks for evoked childhood memories of creating things from pinecones, bark and twigs.

## 10. Cascade by Eloise Gleave

This kinetic mobile showcases the birds of Farnham Heath, the winds movement allows them to cascade as if in flight. Each bird is hand etched onto recycled tin cans to emphasise the need for recycling and a sustainable future to protect our planet and wildlife.

## 11. How old are you? by Jiwen Zou

A large measuring tape wrapped around a tree, marking the tree's unknown age and growth over time.

## 12. HOME by Anchisa Kaewjoey

'Home' explores the deep connection between people, nature and wildlife. It aims to raise awareness for the need to rebalance our world with the use of sustainable materials to create a harmonious, beautiful environment.

## 13. Will-o'-the-Wisps by Delia Cabral

Luminescent ceramic vessels blend invisibly with the landscape by day, then emit an ethereal glow after dusk. This installation inspires visitors to wonder the mysteries of nature & imagine how ancient heathland myths evolved.

## 14. Colour to Cloth by Lil Heyworth

Drawing inspiration from the heathland, particularly planted gorse, heather, silver birch and native ferns, these plants were employed as natural dye sources. The resulting banners serve as a visual representation of place, capturing the heathland's identity.

## 15. Lay Back by Jing Chen

Lay Back offers a space for visitors to lie down and experience the forest from a different perspective—gazing up at the canopy, listening to birdsong and the rustling of leaves. It allows visitors to be immersed in nature with a kind of forest bathing experience.
